Coming up is our program on incorporation efforts for Dana Point since 1959 through cityhood and, then, our annual field trip. This year we are going to Camp Pendleton to see the Old Rancho adobe house and

To put on this event, we have a logistics team that organizes all the permits and equipment needed to support the home tour and parking, nearly eighty docents in shifts to explain the homes on

20 Years of Cityhood To Be Celebrated

In 2009, Dana Point will be celebrating its 20 year anniversary of cityhood. The Historical Society, in conjunction with the City of Dana Point, will be organizing the event, so reserve Saturday, January 3, 2009, at 2 p.m. to have some fun. We are appreciative of the support of the Ocean Institute, OC Dana Point Harbor Department, and the City of Dana Point.

We will reenact the swearing in of the original city council aboard the Brig Pilgrim and will be inviting all prior city council members to be on board the Pilgrim during the mock swearing in.

We are planning additional activities with displays and a souvenir history book outlining the past members of the city council, the history of incorporation, and a yearby-year history of Dana Point in the news from 1989 to the present.

As we get closer, we will have more details. Be sure to reserve the date now!

ityhood for Dana Point has not always been marked by unity of purpose. City Council members have often pursued conflicting ends, and Dana Point residents have, on numerous occasions, found themselves at odds with civic leaders. None of these citizens, however, as displeased as they may have been, ever found leadership as frustrating as did Richard Henry Dana and his crewmates aboard the brig Pilgrim.

"Captain T was a vigorous, energetic fellow," Dana says in Chapter 14 of *Two Years Before the Mast*. "He was made of steel and whalebone. He was a man to 'toe the mark' and to make everyone



else step up to it. During all the time that I was with him, I never saw him sit down on deck. He was always active and driving, severe in his discipline, and expected the same of his officers.

"The mate not being enough of a 'driver' for him, and being perhaps too easy with the crew, the captain was dissatisfied with him, became suspicious that discipline was getting relaxed, and began to interfere in everything. He drew the reins taut, and as in all quarrels between officers the sailors side with the one who treats them best. he became suspicious of the crew. He saw that everything went wrong—that nothing was done 'with a will'—and in his attempt to remedy the difficulty by severity he made everything worse. We were in every respect unfortunately situated—captain, officers, and crew entirely unfitted for one another—and every circumstance and event was like a two-edged sword, and cut both ways."

Dana Point's Incorporation History

Wednesday, October 22, 2008—6:30 p.m. Dana Hills Tennis Center, 24911 Calle de Tenis (Off Golden Lantern just seaward of Del Avion)

Though we are about to celebrate our city's 20th anniversary of incorporation, the idea of its becoming a legal entity was brewing for decades before that. It became a serious issue as Dana Point Harbor's construction got underway.

This meeting will feature a panel, bringing together a leader of the initial 1960s incorporation move, Dr. Roger Sanderson, and a co-petitioner of the 1980s realization of cityhood, Michael Eggers. The local conditions of each era were different, as were the entities who supported and denounced the issue. Some of the incidents surrounding these civic leaders' personal involvement will prove enlightening as well as entertaining.

Social time begins at 6:30 p.m. and the program itself at 7 p.m. Guests are always welcome.
