Please join us for our next Society meeting, which will feature two special guests as well as historical anecdotes from one of our own board members.



In Memoriam: Robert "Bob" Moore


The Dana Point Historical Society is saddened by the loss of our former board member and community activist, Bob Moore, who passed away last month. Bob was an avid supporter of many Dana Point organizations and an elected director of the South Coast District Water Board for many years. Technology and Historic Survey Updates

As a reult of a computer crash last fall and the loss of data, the DPHS Technology Committee has made some changes to our existing computer system. First, we invested in an Apple "Airport" wi-fi connection that will automatically back up our data to make sure nothing is lost in the event of a computer failure like the one we experienced last year. We have also had the good fortune to have a Microsoft employee and history enthusiast, Grant Earl, donate Microsoft's Office 2017 computer program, which also includes additional "cloud" storage capabilities. This is part of Microsoft's ongoing community service program whereby employees who provide Microsoft products and assistance are reimbursed by the company. Grant's initial involvement with us stems from working with the Society to analyze the historic survey conducted by Architectural Resources Group (ARG). The Society is currently organizing that data and looking for any errors or omissions in the report.

Some members of our Historical Society and the Capistrano Beach community advocacy group *Capo Cares* met with John Ciampa and Matt Schneider of the Dana Point City Planning Department to discuss the historic survey completed by ARG. ARG made recommendations to eliminate some properties that first appeared on the previous 1997 survey and were carried over onto the new survey. Nine buildings were obvious because they were demolished, but we are still researching the suggested removal of 22 others. We also discussed outreach efforts to inform homeowners of the benefits of having their historic homes listed on the city registry. Many owners know about the tax savings and increase in property values, but some don't know of the savings on building permits and possible waivers when property improvements are made.
