Their presentations informed us on a variety of topics including the city's regard for Dana Point's history, Basque sheep ranch history in Dana Point, the Golden Age of Surfing and the Toll Bros Apartments that could include a Capistrano Beach Historic Timeline Wall. In addition, we would like to recognize Kate Wheeler, President and CEO of Crystal Cove Conservancy who directed the Conservancy's staff to give our members a timely tour of the newly restored cottages in the Crystal Cove State Park Historic Cottage District.

As in the past, the Society has been invited to participate with other nonprofit organizations for the Festival of Whales, the Dana Point ArtFest, Ocean Institute Maritime Festival and the Arts & Culture Trolley Tour. In response to those invitations, DPHS Booth volunteers have reached out to the public seven days this year. In addition, our docents have kept the museum open three afternoons a week.

Thanks to the Dana Point Sister Cities Association (DPSCA), Keith and I were able to represent the Dana Point Historical Society for its visit to Sorrento, Italy, to help formalize the Dana Point Sister Cities Agreement. Upon arrival, our first activity was to visit the Cloisters of San Francesco, where Dana Point's Artist Exhibit was being unpacked. The Cloisters is in the

heart of Sorrento's historic district, near ocean-view parks and hotels. After briefly assisting to unpack the shipped artwork, we were encouraged to see the local sites. We wandered into the nearby **Imperial** Tramontano Hotel and asked the uniformed doorman if there was an elevator down to the beach. He led us to the 'lift' and told us to press the bell at the bottom when we wished to return. We emerged into a long tunnel and followed it to the opening where changing tents and a long row of chairs were arranged near the water. Was this the hotel early Dana Point investors wanted Sidney H. Woodruff to emulate in 1930? Historian Doris Walker

wrote that the Dana Point Inn, of which only remnants of the arches and elevator remain, was said to be patterned after the resort style of Sorrento, Italy. When we returned to the lobby and read the Tramontano's history, we were convinced it was. As a private mansion in 1541, the Tramontano was the birthplace of Torquato Tasso, the famous Italian poet who wrote "Jerusalem Delivered" and, as a hotel, it has sheltered many famous people including Goethe, Byron, Keats, Scott and Shelley. Longfellow stayed there and James Fenimore Cooper wrote the "Water Witch" while living there. A much longer list of famous names included royalty, but the Tramontano was certainly there in the early 1900s when Dana Point's future investors were guests in clifftop hotels and rode 'lifts' to the seaside below. While in Sorrento, we presented an annotated copy of Two Years Before the Mast to Virgilio Marone High School and copies of Doris Walker's *Home Port for Romance* were presented to the City of Sorrento and the Sorrento Rotary Club by Bob Zasa, DPSCA President, on behalf of the Society. While at the high school, we met faculty members and two young ladies who gave a presentation to us in English on behalf of their fellow students. We were impressed with these students and with the student wall murals we saw, especially one commemorating journalists who were killed due to their newspaper articles about Mafia corruption. We also visited the Sant'Anna Institute, located in a restored convent, where we met the founder and had lunch with American students studying Italian and other languages during a semester abroad from their colleges here in the United States.

In our travels along the beautiful Amalfi Coast, we realized Dana Point is fortunate to have Sorrento as a sister city. We look forward to visits from Sorrento's officials, students and teachers in 2024 and beyond.

A total of \$55 million for the entire cottage project came from many sources, including low-interest loans, donor pledges, grants, institutions and income earned from the existing cottages. Austin introduced us to Randy Gamache, Project Manager of Crystal Cove Management Company, who explained the

detailed process of restoring the cottages, taking each apart board-by-board, while bringing them up to current safety standards. The cottages are restored, inside and outside, to their original appearance. As we toured the interiors of the soon-to- be opened cottages, Randy and Austin shared stories of the families who lived there and of the unusual construction items discovered in the process. A member of one of those families, Laura Davick, is the founder of the Alliance to Rescue Crystal Cove, formed to protect the cove's environment from the runoff of a nearby development, and to prevent the cottages from being demolished for a luxury resort hotel. The





Alliance ultimately became the Crystal Cove Conservancy. After the tour, eleven of us stopped for a delicious lunch at the Beachcomber restaurant and then made a brief visit to Erin Andreatta, Program Manager of the Advocacy and Engagement Office, to thank her for

arranging the tour. Tour participants donated over \$200 toward the Conservancy's impressive educational programs as a thank you for their tour. To learn more, or to visit the Crystal Cove State Park's century-old Historic Cottage District, go to crystalcove.org.



Seaside Inn Update

Renovation appears to be humming along at the former Swallows Inn of Capistrano Beach. Owners Jeff Finn and Danny Hyde, who operate as Artist Guild Hotels, bought the circa 1940s property in a 2021 foreclosure and have been restoring the historic motor inn ever since. Early on, supply chain issues created some problems, but now the project seems to be nearing completion. Many in the area hardly recognize the property from its previous days of dilapidation as a derelict and abandoned

building. The entire community looks forward to an announcement regarding the motel's opening.


