President's Message, Holiday 2017

November is the month set aside by the United States to give thanks for our blessings. On Veterans Day weekend we thank and honor veterans and active duty service members for their service to our country. We lay wreaths and place flags on the graves of veterans who served and those who sacrificed their lives defending our freedom around the world. We also would like to thank first responders who protect and help us when accidents, crimes and disasters occur.

Our November 10 visit to the USS battleship *Iowa* provided a timely opportunity to honor our veterans. As we gathered to board the bus, veteran David Kristjanson reminded us that the day was the US Marine Corp's 242nd birthday. After arriving at Los Angeles harbor we learned that we had a total of 10 veterans with us who would be admitted without charge, a holiday gift to the Historical Society.

As we toured the *Iowa* with service veterans who volunteer as guides, we learned she was commissioned in February 1943, and had the honor of transporting President Franklin D. Roosevelt across the Atlantic to Europe in 1943 for meetings with our allies, which included the Teheran Conference. We visited the suite specially outfitted with a tub for the paralyzed President. There is an expansive exhibit in the museum beneath the main deck detailing the *Iowa*'s history from 1943 until its acquisition by the Pacific Battleship Center in San Pedro in 2011. Among the displays were the photos of the 47 crewmen killed when an accidental powder explosion ripped through a 16-inch gun turret on April 19, 1989, during a gunnery exercise. The incident was one of the Navy's worst casualties during peacetime and changed the powder- handling procedures for battleships.

The tour of the Los Angeles Fire Station 112s Fire Boat, the *Warner Lawrence*, was a perfect example of first responders coming to the rescue. In this case it was because we had not been informed that the "Old Fire Station 36s Museum" had closed due to Veterans Day. The *Warner Lawrence* crew paused their maintenance activities and "saved our day" by offering us a tour of the boat and the harbor and showed us the boat's impressive maneuvering capabilities during the crew's lunch break. Yet another example of why we appreciate our first responders. Everyone enjoyed the excursion and we applaud our committee's efforts to accommodate last-minute changes and provide refreshments on the return to Dana Point.

Our October 25 meeting was a success thanks to Joe Dunn and Wayne Schafer, who presented Dunn's book, *Indian:* The Life of Osage Waterman Wayne Schafer. It was

On the Water! Our Field Trip to the Battleship Iowa and a Surprise from the Firefighters of the Los Angeles Fire Department!



Over 30 members and guests of the Historical Society attended our annual November field trip. This year's excursion was a tour aboard the battleship USS Iowa, located at the Port of Los Angeles in San Pedro. Attendees were greeted by docents who



escorted us throughout the ship including upper decks and, following lunch in the Officers Mess, below deck through galleys, machine shops, enlisted men's berths, and the ship's museum.



The "plan" for our second stop on our trip was to visit "Old Fire Station 36," housed in one of the oldest buildings in San Pedro and just steps away from the battleship Iowa. But the station was closed because of the Veterans Day holiday. Fortunately for our group, Bill and Elizabeth Bamattre (shown lower right with fireman Daryl Bennett, center) were part of our tour and Bill, with his many years of service with the L.A. Fire Department, arranged an on-the-spot tour of the NEW harbor station Number 112s, which was

dedicated in 1995 and houses the spectacular Fire Boat No. 2, the *Warner Lawrence*. Put into service in 2003, the boat is the premier workhorse of the Port of Los Angeles Fire Department.







Museum Receives Gift from Local Author





City Honors Longtime Resident Artist Mary Carmen

On October 17, 2017, at the Dana Point City Council Meeting, the Dana Point Historical Society participated in the presentation to recognize Mary Carmen (professionally known as Maria del Carmen Calvo) for her contributions to the city through her fame as a world-renowned impressionist painter and as an art instructor. Together, Mary Carmen and her husband, Dr. Walter Henry, were also celebrated for their willingness to share their magnificent home through charity home tours and community events in Capistrano Beach. Since 1985, Mary Carmen has transformed their simple ranchstyle home into a unique, eclectic European manse that reflects her classical Spanish fine arts training and international influences. Rather than tearing down the original house, Mary Carmen transformed it into a painter's canvas. Her attention to detail and the artistic genius behind her whimsical approach to design delights the senses with color, unique finishes, artful enhancement of light and shadow and

furnishings that range from priceless antiques to industrial-style artifacts with a surprising mix of objets d'art.

The home and extensive gardens (entry shown below, right) have been featured in many art and design publications and numerous articles describe Mary Carmen and Walter's home as a romantic masterpiece, "a painterly oasis as concrete as the clouds," and "an ongoing journey where art, garden and home merge into the whole of a trinity, where each aspect of one informs the others."

The city's official proclamation ends: "On behalf of the City Council and the citizens of Dana Point, I, Debra Lewis, Mayor, hereby recognize Maria Del Carmen Calvo, a quintessential artist in every fiber of her being, for her artistic contributions to the world; her magnificent home and gardens, and her contributions to the community at large. Mary Carmen's contributions to the City of Dana Point and the world at large will surely lead to the future designation of her property as a historic resource to be preserved for years to come. The City of Dana Point thanks her for her outstanding artistic talent, accomplishments, and contributions to Dana Point's history." ~~~ Sandie Iverson

We will also have other DPHS merchandise available including our limited-edition ornament featuring our city seal (left).


This holiday season will also be your last chance to view the current museum exhibit featuring the Time Capsule contents from 2016. The exhibit will

Historic Tax Credit in Jeopardy!

Keith Johannes, DPHS Preservation Chair, reports that the tax reform bill introduced in the House of Representatives this November would eliminate the federal Historic Tax Credit program (HTC). The program, which encourages the redevelopment of historic and abandoned buildings, has, according to analysis from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, been used to renovate more than 40,000 structures and channel \$117 billion in private investment since being enacted 1981. Reports state that for every dollar in tax credits, the program created \$1.20 in construction activity, business taxes, income taxes and property taxes.

Also, contacting your congressman (in Orange County, either Darrell Issa or Dana Rohrabacher) will help to add voices to those who oppose this change.
