November Weekend Will Commemorate 200th Anniversary of the Raid on San Juan Capistrano



The San Juan Capistrano Historical Society and the Dana Point Historical Society invite the public to join in marking the 200th anniversary of the Raid on San Juan Capistrano by Argentinian patriot and alleged "pirate" Hipólito Bouchard (below) in 1818. On Saturday, November 3, a group of Living History "pirates" will recreate the historic walk from Dana Point to San Juan Capistrano to "sack" the town. The walk will begin at 11 a.m., starting at Trabuco Creek Trail at Descanso Park, 32506 Paseo Adelanto, SJC, and end at Los Rios Park, 31747 Los Rios Street, where the "sacking" will commence. Downtown merchants will be "pillaged" until approximately 1 p.m. This will be immediately followed by a family-friendly "Pirate Fiesta" at the Blas Aguilar Adobe organized by curator Domingo Belardes. Food, games and children's events will be featured until 4 p.m.

The *Living History* "pirates" group will then camp overnight on the grounds of the SJC Historical Society. On **Sunday, November 4**, the public is invited to attend the "trial" of Bouchard at a joint meeting of the Societies at the San Juan Capistrano Community Center at **2:30 p.m.**, located at **25925 Camino del Avion, SJC**. A jury will render a verdict deciding if Bouchard is a patriot, privateer or pirate at approximately 3:30 p.m. All daytime events are free and open to public. Celebrating the Innovation of Waterman Hobie Alter in October

The Hobie Cat Company has announced the 50th anniversary celebration of the *Hobie Cat*, scheduled for **Saturday**, **October 27**, **2018 at 9 a.m.** at Doheny State Beach, Dana Point. First developed in 1968, the celebration of the Hobie 14 will feature the "Hobie Cat Funtastico," a 10-mile distance catamaran race that will launch from Doheny State Beach and sail past historic Hobie landmarks along the way.

As an added tribute, the presentation of the life-sized Hobie Alter statue will take

place in the near future, pending completion of the project. The City of Dana Point will announce the date and it will take place at the new linear park adjacent to the South Cove development at 34202 Del Obispo Street. The statue, a bronze creation designed by local artist Lance Jost, will be the anchor piece of a series of statues of local legendary watermen, sculpted by local artist Bill Limebrook.

Where has the summer gone? It began with our June Scholarship Fiesta Fundraiser, a very successful event thanks to the 70 members who reserved in advance or purchased tickets that evening. Nine Historical Society members enjoyed a trip to Madame Helena Modjeska's *Arden* on July 21. This National Landmark is one of Orange County Parks' treasures and is limited to small group tours of up to 15 people, if you reserve far enough in advance. There is no entrance fee to experience Madame Modjeska's rural retreat and visiting there helps one appreciate her renown as the Shakespearean actress of her day.

The Board of Directors wish to thank our faithful members who volunteered for our booth at the Ocean Institute Tall Ships Festival on September 7-9. Bob Minty, Vice President of Programs, also shared his expertise on the history of whaling at a separate venue, one of the Ocean Institute's many activities that included ship tours, cannon battles, mermaids and pirate encampments.

Mission San Juan Capistrano. It is planned for the first weekend of November, Saturday the 3rd and Sunday the 4th, and is not to be missed. Adults, children and grandchildren will have the chance to dress as Argentinian mariners or "pirates" and decide at the November 4th trial whether Bouchard was an Argentinian Patriot sailing for independence from Spain or simply a pirate raiding the mission. This once-in-a-century event is co-sponsored with the San Juan Capistrano Historical Society and our participation is organized by Bob Minty.

In Memoriam: Rodney Howorth, 1940-2018

How sad to report that we have lost one of the best of our Historical Society's pillars—our longtime friend and colleague, Rodney Howorth. Rod passed away on August 1 after a long illness.

Rod was a member of the Board of Directors of the Historical Society for the past 14 years. He served as Secretary, as Publicity and Public Relations Chair, as Committee Chair for the Baby Beach Tile Wall Project and most recently as Chair of our Merchandise Sales. Rod served on every Home Tour Committee after he joined the Board and handled all the logistics that contributed to the smooth operations of these events. He wrote articles for our newsletter, assisted with most every event that featured our Outreach Booth, volunteered as a docent at our museum and, in general, was always helpful with a gracious good spirit and ready smile. An article written about Rod a few years ago in the Historical Society Newsletter was titled, "If You Need Something Done, Ask a Busy Man." For Rod Howorth, that says it all.

Rod was also a pillar of our community with his work as President of the Lantern Village Association, in which capacity he worked for the improvement of the historic core area of Dana Point. He contributed also as a board member of the Dana Point Civic Association, the group

that brings us the monthly "Coffee Chat" meetings. Rod was a member of the committee that brought back the Festival of Whales Parade in 2002 and participated in city government as Chairman of the Dana Point Traffic Improvement Subcommittee. There were many other miscellaneous efforts on his part to participate in and improve life in Dana Point. All this led to his being chosen as Citizen of the Year by the Dana Point Chamber of Commerce for 2008.

Rodney Howorth was born in Indiana, Pennsylvania, and moved to Akron, Ohio, with his family as a young boy and then to California when he was 16. He attended Orange High School, during which time he drove down many times with his friends to surf at Killer Dana and Doheny State Beach. He graduated from California State University, Fullerton, and, subsequently, had a 35-year career with Rockwell International where he was an Executive Advisor and Contract Negotiator. During those years he lived in several places around the Los Angeles area as his work demanded, many of those years on Balboa Island in Newport Beach. He bought his home in the Lantern Village area of Dana Point and moved here in 1980, glad to be near the beach in this welcoming small town. Rod's sister, Susan, reports that he was an entrepreneur from a young age, selling cards and magazines and earning money for the special cars that he loved. We all admired the more exotic acquisitions of his later years. Rod loved his home here and had happy memories of the special places that existed in those early days.

Those of us who knew Rod and worked with him will always remember his generosity, his great sense of humor, willingness to help and his caring about those around him. So, we must bid a long, fond farewell to this good citizen and good friend.

November 8 Field Trip Will Feature W.K. Kellogg House in Pomona



Our annual field trip on Thursday, November 8, will be a visit to cereal magnate W.K. Kellogg's West Coast retreat, an 8,777 square-foot house built in 1926 at a cost of \$150,000. The home sits on the northern edge of the Cal Poly Pomona campus. The Kellogg ranch became well known in Southern California for its horse exhibitions and breeding program. It was also a venue for the Kelloggs to entertain assorted Hollywood celebrities and to open the ranch to the public. Myron Hunt, a distinguished southland architect whose projects included the Pasadena Rose Bowl and the

Huntington Library, was commissioned to design W.K. Kellogg's new West Coast estate. Myron Hunt designed not only the main house and guest cottage you pass as you enter the main gate, but also the Arabian stables

and the other ranch buildings, including the Manor House. The Manor House was originally built for Kellogg's eldest son Karl and his family. Karl agreed to move to California and manage his father's ranch in hopes the weather would improve his health following a bout with tuberculosis. Today, the Cal Poly Pomona university president and his family occupy the Manor House. Because W.K. Kellogg loved the outdoors, his house was set on top of the hill to take full



advantage of the Pomona Valley panorama. Charles Gibbs Adams was selected to landscape the grounds. One of his more notable commissions was the Hearst Castle garden in San Simeon, California. Most of the furniture and décor that adorn the house are original pieces once owned by Kellogg and his family.

W.K. Kellogg deeded 813 acres of land to the state of California in 1949 prior to his death in 1951. In 1956, 508 students and 44 faculty and staff moved to the new Kellogg campus. In a first for the all-male campus, 329 women joined the student body in 1961. The Pomona campus separated from the San Luis Obispo campus in 1966 and became California State Polytechnic College, Kellogg Campus. University status was granted in 1972. Today, the university is part of the 23-campus California State University system. Cal Poly Pomona has about 24,000 students and 2,600 faculty and staff.


Tour groups are only allowed at the ranch during weekday hours. The Society has reserved Thursday, November 8. The cost of the trip is \$60 for members (\$70 for non-members) which includes bus transportation to the site and admission fee to the house, grounds, stables and the ranch farm market. A buffet lunch is included as are refreshments on the return bus trip. The tour bus will board at Strands parking lot at 9:30 a.m. and will return at approximately 4 p.m.

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



Lifestyle Retail, The Story of The Hobie Surf Shops is the title of author Joe Dunn's new book. It is the story of the Hobie shops and the two principals involved, which heavily features Dick Metz who opened, owned and ran Hobie Alter's first retail shop in Honolulu. The book references the youths of the two men and contin-

ues through the history of the shops up to the present owners. The book is being funded by the Surfing Heritage and Culture Center and Dick Metz will organize the book's debut. Two book signing events are planned for Autumn; one private event at the Surfing Heritage and Cultural Center in San Clemente and another for the public at the Dana Point Hobie Shop.
