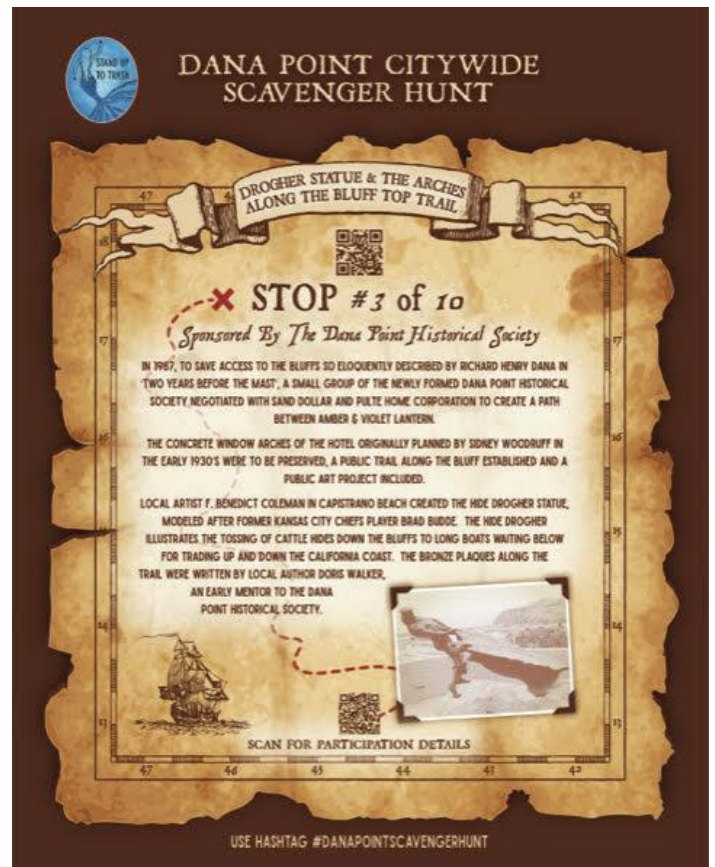

DPHS Participates in Stand Up To Trash Scavenger Hunt

The Bluff Top Trail Park will be one of the featured stops of the 2024 Citywide Earth Day Scavenger Hunt organized by Stand Up To Trash, as featured in the City of Dana Point LOOKOUT Magazine, Spring 2024 Community News Recreation Guide on page 11. The Scavenger Hunt will be held April 1 through April 22, and will explore stops around our city from Salt Creek Beach to Doheny with stops in between. The Historical Society is sponsoring Stop #3 – The Hide Drogher statue and The Dana Point Inn Arches on the Bluff Top Trail. This stop is dear to us because the Historical Society was formed in 1987 during the effort to save public access to the Bluff Top Trail when developers were preparing the area for a residential condominium complex. Other



stops will include the Richard Henry Dana Statue, Hansen Courtyard at Dana Wharf, the Nature Interpretive Center and Acjachemen Kiitcha Huts, the Palisades Gazebo, Youngs Beach Shack at Salt Creek, Doheny Beach Aquarium and Butterfly Garden, and Killer Dana Beach. Society Mourns Death of Bea Reed

The Dana Point Historical Society is saddened to learn of the death of Bea Reed, one of our earliest and most loyal supporters of what was originally the Dana Point/Capistrano Beach Historical Society. Bea was an avid supporter and served as Corresponding Secretary for the Society from 1997-1999.

Bea was a proud resident of her home town and a civic leader in the Capistrano Beach Community Association. She was honored by our Society in May 2011 as the recipient of our Founders Day award, an honor given out annually that seeks to recognize community members who have played an integral part in the development of Dana Point. At the Founders Day event, former Mayors Karen Lloreda and Harold Kaufman detailed Bea's involvement and support of the incorporation of the City of Dana Point.

We celebrated Bea's 90th birthday at Doheny State Beach (pictured right, with DPHS board member Judy Henderson at right) during our 2015 Scholarship Picnic at Doheny Beach. Bea was a classy, fun lady who loved her home in coastal California.



Sister Cities Delegation Visits Dana Point Historical Society Museum

Sister Cities Delegates from Sorrento, Italy (pictured below), visited our DPHS Museum, escorted by City Manager Mike Killebrew, while touring City Hall on February 28th. Our 1924 Dana Point exhibit displayed the early influence Sorrento had on Dana Point investors J. L. Beebe and his wife, H. Eva Beebe. Dr. and Mrs. Beebe were impressed with the similarities of the natural



harbors and the headlands of Sorrento and Dana Point. A 1928 Woodruff realtor's photo album from our archives includes the photos of Sorrento that inspired Sidney H. Woodruff's hotel designs to attract investors to the 1930 Dana Point Inn, which included an elevator shaft inspired by the Sorrento-style resorts, such as The Imperial Tramontano Hotel that Keith and I visited when in Sorrento last October. Luigi Di Prisco, president of the Sorrento City Council, offered to send us photos of present-day Sorrento and he is now in the process of emailing them. Our thanks to Enzo Scognamiglio, pictured far left, Brio restaurant owner and DPHS Life Member, who translated for

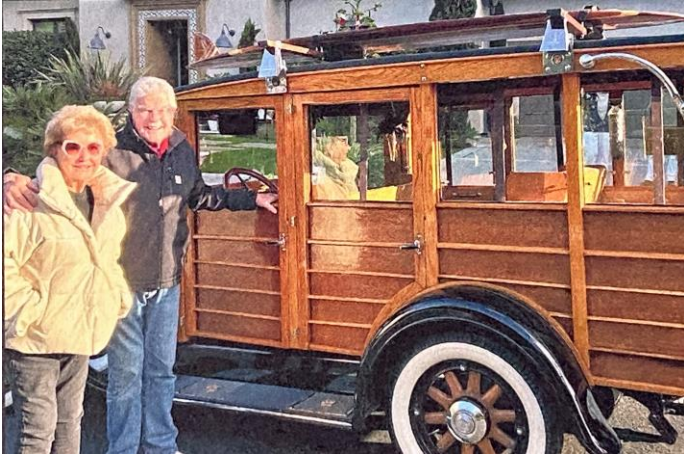
those Italian visitors who didn't understand rapidly spoken English. Also pictured are Luigi D'Elise, Luigi Di Prisco, Silvana Gargiulo and Rossella Savarese. Currently, Dana Bay Gallery on Del Prado has extended its Sorrento Sister Cities Art exhibit, featuring oil paintings of Sorrento by Antonio Di Viccaro, a well-known Italian artist who paints with a palette knife. The exhibit also includes works by local artists whose paintings were displayed last October at the Cloisters in Sorrento. All DPHS members were invited to attend the exhibit on Friday, March 1st, and the invitation still stands while the paintings are there until the end of March.
